

Medical & Urgent Eye Care

DID YOU KNOW

- All Albertans have access to medical and urgent eye care provided by an optometrist.
- Alberta Health coverage is available towards medically necessary and urgent care appointments.
- A referral is not required.
- Most optometrists will see patients the same day if the matter is urgent.
- Optometrists have the proper knowledge, tools and equipment necessary to diagnose, treat, prescribe medications, and refer to a specialist, if needed.

Medical & Urgent Care services include:

- Infection, injury or inflammation of the eye and eyelid.
- Dry eye.
- Foreign objects in the eye.
- Sudden changes in vision.
- Monitoring for diabetes and glaucoma complications.
- Retinal detachment, defects and diseases.
- Pre and post-operative care for cataract patients.

Comprehensive Eye Exams

DID YOU KNOW

During a comprehensive eye exam your optometrist examines the tissues and structures inside the eye, looking for eye diseases such as cataracts, glaucoma or macular degeneration, as well as tears in the retina, bleeding and tumours.

Your optometrist is also looking for early signs of serious medical conditions, such as high blood pressure, diabetes and cardiovascular diseases during an exam.

Your eye exam includes a series of tests. There is much more to a comprehensive eye exam than checking how well you can see and determining your eye glass prescription (refraction).



When to have an eye exam





Toddlers & Preschoolers At least one eye exam between the ages of two and five.



Kindergarten* An eye exam when they begin kindergarten.



Adults At least every two years.
