

New requirements to make certification more accessible

We want certification to be more accessible to nurses while maintaining our established high quality and credibility. We've heard from you that the CNA Certification Program must evolve to match changes in nursing curriculums and practice. That's why the eligibility specialty experience hours required for nurses to apply for certification will be reduced.

New exam eligibility requirements



Two options (applies to all exams except wound, ostomy and continence):

- 1,950 hours of experience in your nursing specialty within the last five years (formerly 3,900 hours).
- 1,000 hours of experience in your nursing specialty within the last five years plus 300 hours of formal education, which can be a specialty post-basic course or program at a college/university (as opposed to the former 2,925 hours of specialty experience plus education).

Wound, ostomy and continence (no change):

 Proof of a successful completed full scope wound, ostomy and continence nursing education program



Why do nurses get certified?



- Employment opportunity and/or requirement
- Professional development and growth
- Recognition of specialized knowledge
- Aligns with jurisdictional continuing competence requirements

Initial certification achieved by successfully completing CNA's specialty practice exam, which is composed of over 165 items. (Nurses' input is sought after each exam cycle.)





Exam Preparation

The CNA Certification Program is designed to evaluate the knowledge and skills expected of a nurse with experience in a given specialty. The exam will test you on national standards created by nursing experts rather than a core curriculum of study.

Study resources

Because the exam will assess your experience, your preparation will be based on what you already know. You should therefore study to refresh your knowledge of your nursing specialty, especially those practice areas you haven't been exposed to recently.




Computer-based testing Info



Demonstration guide and specialty practice test

- Available before you take the exam
- Contains 100 practice questions in the same computer-based testing (CBT) environment used by Pearson VUE exam centres





Study tips

- Review competencies
- Perform a self-assessment to determine your level of knowledge about each competency
 - Self-assessment should reflect your knowledge of the theory and evidence, not just your clinical experience
- Determine priorities for your study based on your self-assessment and the exam blueprint





Create a study plan


- List all the topics you want to review and create a realistic study schedule
- Study your weakest subjects first, but stick to a time limit
- Make a commitment to stay with your plan, revising only when required
- Plan to complete your overall study at least two weeks before exam date





Preparation

- Create a learning environment
- Customize based on your learning style
- Use multiple learning strategies
- Study with others





Exam results



- Email sent three weeks after the last day of the exam administration period
- Official result letter sent six weeks later
- Successful candidates receive letter, certification pin and certificate
- Unsuccessful candidates receive letter and exam performance profile





Why do nurses renew their certification?



- Professional pride
- Desire to be current in one's specialty practice
- Requirement for employment
- Worked hard for initial certification and renewal by CL hours deemed feasible

Renewal is required **every five years** and can be achieved through proof of 100 hours of continuous learning (CL) in the specialty practice or by rewriting the exam. (Nurses' input is sought after each renewal cycle.)

Continuous learning activities



Focused on your specialty nursing earned during the 5-year term.

Examples of CL activities include the following:

- Conferences, teleconferences, seminars, workshops
- Employer in-services
- Leadership of a certification exam study group
- Professional committee membership or participation
- Presentations/lectures/poster
- Preceptorship

- Academic courses and independent study
- Involvement in the CNA
 Certification Program as a
 mentor or participation in exam
 development activities
- Membership in a national specialty association (4 CL hours/year)


